We started the new year (January) with a Lunch and Learn led by Elhadj Fallou Ndiaye (8). He shared with us about his family's home of Senegal, Africa.



Scholars tasted Jollof rice, or ceebu jen as it's known in Senegal. It is perhaps the best-known West African dish because it's delicious, colorful, and easy to prepare. (Many of our scholars really enjoyed and wanted more!) The rice is from a local African restaurant, **Bala's Bistro.** Fallou's family made us Bissap, also known as hibiscus tea. It is a drink made from the dried

flowers of the Roselle plant, a variety of Hibiscus. Thank you to the Ndiaye family for sharing your culture with us!





Fallou also shared the game Yoté with the Optional scholars. Yoté is a strategy board game popular due to its fast pace and surprising turnarounds. A player wins by capturing all their opponent's pieces. Thank you, Fallou, for sharing with us about

your family's culture. You did a "magnifique" job!! (magnificent in French)

International Studies posters were due in January. 8th grade's country of focus is the Netherlands. Daniela Mascote (8) chose to learn about

February is African American History Month. Many of our Craigmont scholars created slides that are posted in the hall on the way to the cafeteria.



In honor of this month, February's Lunch and Learn celebrated Ghana. Ghana is also the Memphis in May country of focus this year!

Scholars learned about the history of Ghana. (Its history is also a small part of their Seventh grade



Social Studies curriculum!) Scholars learned about its natural resources of gold and salt which made it a center of trade in its beginnings. Scholars also learned about the "door of no return" where many Africans left on slave ships from Ghana. Finally, scholars learned about one of its main exports today, the cocoa bean used for making chocolate!



The Memphis in May crate with artifacts from Ghana arrived the week we had our Lunch and Learn! Scholars also got to learn more by interacting with the items in the crate.





To taste, scholars tried chocolate from Ghana. They also tasted tiger nuts which are used in many dishes throughout the region. Surprisingly, tiger nuts are not actually nuts, but rather edible tubers. They are the size of a

chickpea but wrinkly with a chewy texture and sweet

nutty flavor. Coconut water was tried as well. Coconut water is used as a drink and in many of the Ghanaian recipes.




