
Optional Scholars participate in International Studies, learning about the cultures of others in our world. Our focus countries for the year are:

It usually contains dried chilies such as ancho, guajillo, and chipotle peppers. Mole also contains a variety of spices. It can also contain chocolate and/or nuts to make the flavor smoother. It is normally eaten over chicken or pork, with a side of rice and eaten with corn tortillas. Deliciosa!!
