Learn. Russia is the largest country – spanning two continents (Europe and Asia). Scholars learned the oldest human

settlement in Russia dates to 8th century BC.



Russian is the official language of Russia. Did you know it is the 7th most spoken language in the world?

Scholars tasted Kompot, a tea made from dried fruits. It is a common drink in Russia and can vary in taste based



on what dried fruits are used. They also tried Pryaniki, a popular Russian cookie. Pryaniki first became popular in the 9th century. It is often referred to as a gingerbread cookie.





November's Lunch and Learn was led by Jaliyah White (8) and Nakiah Green (7). They chose the country of Norway

to research and share with their Optional peers. Norway is a European country whose average height has reached its PEAK level. Mountains covered in ice masses dominate the surface! We learned a few Norwegian phrases - God dag! or God dagonly! (good day), God kveld! (good evening), and God Morgen (good morning). Norway has had a monarchy for over a thousand years. Today, Norway is a constitutional monarchy where the king is formally the head of state but royal duties are mostly representative / ceremonial.

Scholars tasted salmon chips. Yes, chips made from salmon! The chips are high in protein, collagen, and part of the Norwegian diet. They



also tried Glogg – a traditional winter drink spiced with cinnamon, cloves, cardamom,





To end Quarter 2, Elijah Johnson (8) and Diprojit Paul Dipro (8) chose to

share about **Germany**. Did you know Volkswagen, Audi, Porsche, BMW, and Mercedes-Benz are all German brands? Oktober Fest dates back to 1810 when a royal marriage occurred. Munich enjoyed the celebrating so much that they have continued it every year since then. Today,

Oktober Fest is celebrated in many countries. German is the second most spoken language in Europe! Scholars also discussed the Holocaust what occurred. We made comparisons to events in today's society and they are encouraged to remain aware of what occurs not just in Memphis but elsewhere.

For their taste, scholars tried Bahlsen cookies. Bahlsen is a German based



company. Its best-known product is the Leibniz-Keks (butter biscuit), introduced in 1891. They also tried a "Winterzeit" tea made by Teekanne, a German tea company founded in 1882. The company was the first to sell tea in tins and went on to invent the machine-made tea bag!





Some of the selections at the Winter Concert were from other countries. The CMS Choir sang "Silent Night" in English, German, French and Sign Language! CMS Chiefs are International Learners.
