

ELPA CORNER

Multilingual learners use and develop language through speaking, listening, reading, and writing activities to communicate in English. When it's too hot to go outside during these warmer months, watch kid-friendly movies or shows in English with subtitles as a family. Pause at certain points during the movie to ask questions: "What do you think will happen next?" or "Why did the character do that?" Afterward, ask your child to draw, act out, and write a sentence about their favorite scene in English. This will help your child practice all four language domains while at home.

WHAT IS ESL?

HOW WILL I FIND OUT MY CHILD'S ELPA21 SCORE?

Your school will provide you with a full report of your child's performance on ELPA21. You should receive your child's scores within the first few weeks of school of the 2025-26 school year. There is a picture of what the form looks like below and to the right.

HOW CAN THESE RESULTS BE USED?

The results will be used to help teachers identify students who need additional support in each language area. The information will also be used to measure how well schools and school districts are helping English learners achieve higher expectations.

HERE ARE SOME SUGGESTED QUESTIONS TO ASK WHEN DISCUSSING THE RESULTS WITH YOUR CHILD'S TEACHER(S):

- Where is my child doing well, and where does he or she need improvement?
- What can be done in the classroom to help improve his or her area(s) of weakness?
- What can be done to appropriately challenge my child in areas where he or she is close to demonstrating proficiency?
- How can I help support my child's language learning at home?
- How do we ensure that my child continues to progress?

Coping with Culture Shock

Culture shock is a reaction to the changes and differences encountered when moving to a new location and experiencing a new culture. Students may experience feelings of confusion, anxiety, or even isolation as they navigate unfamiliar customs, expectations, and social dynamics.

Parents can help students cope with culture shock by fostering:



Open Communication:

Create a safe space for students to express their feelings about the new environment, both positive and negative. Ask specific questions about their experiences and validate their emotions, avoiding dismissive responses.

Build Social Connections:

Encourage students to make friends with both locals and other expatriates. Help them find activities and organizations that align with their interests, such as clubs, faith communities, or sports teams.

Familiar Routines and Belongings:

Maintain some familiar routines at home, like family dinners or bedtime stories, and surround them with familiar objects from their old life.

Normalize the Experience:

Let them know that culture shock is a normal experience and that many people go through it.

Sharing your own experiences with cultural adjustment can be helpful.

Steps to Take in High School

- Get to know your High School Counselor.
- Download the PowerSchool App to keep track of your attendance, grades, and credits.
- 22 credits are required to graduate.
- Participate in extracurricular activities to help acquire scholarships.
- Consider participating in academic enrichment programs, summer workshops, internships, honors classes, and Advanced Placement (AP) classes.
- Register for ACT/SAT tutoring and testing. (www.act.org)
- Keep your GPA up!

COMMUNITY RESOURCES

Welcome back to another great school year! As part of the community resources section, we want to ensure a successful school year for families and students by informing them that there are two types of libraries to visit: traditional and electronic libraries. Memphis public libraries are dedicated to encouraging everyone, particularly children, to read. Many libraries provide reading programs and much more for school-aged children as well as younger children. Visit Library Finder and input your ZIP code. Then go to your local public library's website and select "children's programs." It will next tell you about the programs in your area that encourage children to read. We also have the Tennessee Electronic Library (TEL) to access periodicals, journals, newspapers, essays, e-books, primary source materials, test preparation, homework help, genealogy data, career searches, and other resources. TEL resources are free and accessible from any computer with Internet access in Tennessee.

Communication with the School/Teachers

Parents/Guardians, did you know that all teachers have an email address that is shared with students and can often be found on the school's website? Try introducing yourself and your student with an email! Share relevant information and strengths, offer to volunteer to help the class, and ask questions about class assignments and/or expectations. You can also ask your student's ESL teacher for a copy of their Individual Learning Plan (ILP). Many email platforms now include translation features, so don't let a language barrier get in the way of supporting your student.

All schools have a service called LanguageLine, which provides phone-based translation support. Call or visit the school, request an interpreter, and request to speak with your student's teacher. Click here to print out this card to request an interpreter.
