Directions

- 1. Head: On the front, draw and color the face of the main character. On the back, print your name and the title of the book.
- 2. Chest/Upper Torso: On the front, draw and color the setting (where and when the story takes place) On the back, write 2-3 sentences describing the setting.
- 3. Abdomen/Hips: Write one paragraph (3-5 sentences) that explains the main problem in the book.
- 4. Both Upper Arms: Write on the front, the names of other important characters in the book. On the back, write why they are important to the story.
- 5. Both Lower Arms: Write 2 interesting details from the book on each arm, (4 details in all)
- 6. Thighs; On the front, draw and color a picture of something you find exciting in the story. On the back, explain what you are drawing.
- 7. Lower Legs: Write 2-3 sentences that explain how the main character solves the main problem of the story.
- 8. Feet: Have students locate two current event articles (in the news) that the main character in the book might be interested in reading. After they've found the article, have them write the headline on one side of the foot and explain why the character would find the article interesting and how they relate to the book on the other foot.
- 9. Attach the parts according to the diagram on the back by using string, yarn, or pipe cleaners.
